In honour of International Women's Day, we highlight the Safe in Salford partnership, a key project by Salford Foundation supporting domestic abuse survivors in Salford and Greater Manchester.

This one-stop support service, led by the Salford Foundation and partnering with TDAS, TLC, and The Pankhurst Trust, prioritises victim experiences to enhance domestic abuse services.

Through awareness, education, individual and group support, safety planning, and practitioner training, it aims to improve safety and recovery. Anybody living in Salford experiencing domestic abuse can access this support and begin their journey towards a life free from domestic abuse, our dedicated and passionate staff aim to ensure that all the necessary support is in place to ensure individuals receive 'the right support at the right time'.

This includes support for children and young people who may be affected or experiencing abuse themselves. We also have a behaviour change programme led by TLC which focuses on change and education for those who are displaying abusive and harmful behaviours so that they also can seek the intervention needed to stop causing harm in their relationships.

In 2025, Safe in Salford will launch its own website, providing a hub for survivors, victims, and their supporters to access resources and empower themselves.



Salford Foundation manages the Safe in Salford (SIS) Partnership, a “one front door”, community-based service which supports over 2,000 victims, survivors, young people who harm and perpetrators of domestic abuse each year.

The SIS delivery partners include , **Salford Foundation, Pankhurst Trust, Trafford Domestic Abuse Service (TDAS) and Talk Listen Change (TLC).**

Pankhurst Trust manage and deliver the **IRIS (Identification & Referral to Improve Safety)** programme. This is a specialist training, referral, and advocacy model that enables clinicians to better support their patients who are affected by domestic abuse and violence.



The IRIS programme is nationally recognised, evidence-based and cost-effective intervention which aims to improve the primary care response to domestic violence. It provides in-house domestic abuse and violence training for **general practice (GP)** teams and a named “**Advocate Educator**” which patients can be referred to for individual support.

The **Advocate Educator** also advocates for patients, undertakes risk assessments, provides options and support to patients who are referred into the IRIS service, as well as implementing safeguarding strategies.



In Salford, Pankhurst team consists of a **Project Manager**, two **Advocate Educators** and a **Clinical Lead**, who is a local practising GP. The Advocate Educator and Clinical Lead work in partnership to deliver training to the practices, specialist advice and support to GP teams.

The Advocate Educator also advocates for patients, undertakes risk assessments, provides options and support to patients who are referred into the IRIS service, as well as implementing safeguarding strategies.

Pankhurst Trust currently supports **33 GP practices throughout Salford**. Since April 2022, they have supported **796 patients** in Salford and trained **1,423 professionals**.

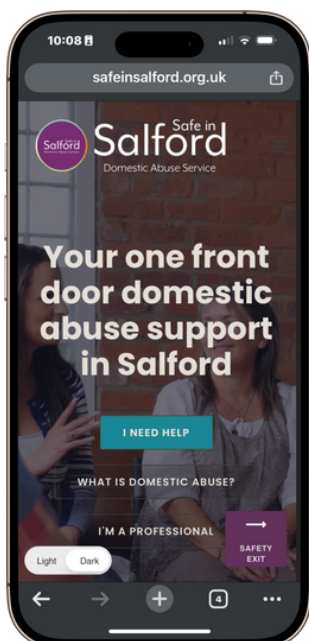
A New Era for Safe in Salford

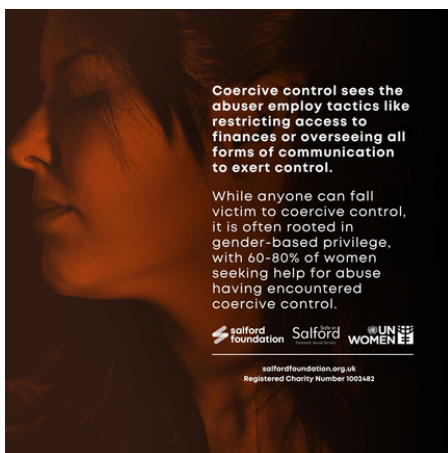

In Retrospect: 16 Days of Activism

The “16 Days of Activism” campaign on domestic abuse successfully organically reached over 5,000 people, raising awareness of domestic abuse signs and safety for victims and survivors, while also guiding young perpetrators on accessing behavior change support through our partners, Harbour and TLC.



From **November 2024 to January 2025**, we saw a **significant increase in telephone enquiries to our Safe in Salford Helpline** with a total of **692 calls**. Our website also saw a spike in visitors to our Safe in Salford Partnership which is our **2nd most popular page visited**. A total of **1,686 visits to the page Oct 2024-December 2025**.

We are planning to continue to run social media awareness campaigns throughout the year to ensure that children, young people and adults in Salford who need information, advice and support, can access relevant domestic abuse services.
